## **Stay Safe Policy**

## Scoil Bhríde, Rathcormac

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## Introductory Statement

The staff and management of Scoil Bhríde, Rathcormac have developed and agreed this policy in line with current recommendations and guidelines relating to child safeguarding and child abuse prevention, particularly 'Stay Safe. Best Practice in Child Protection: Guidelines for Schools' produced by the PDST. This policy works in tandem with our Social, Personal and Health Education (SPHE) policy (See Appendix 1).

The staff of Scoil Bhríde will always ensure that the safety and well-being of our pupils is our highest priority. Staff work consistently to build a safe, caring, responsive environment and we are continually promoting safety awareness and personal safety skills in both discrete and incidental ways. Staff are also constantly aware of positively supporting pupils in reporting any issues or concerns that they might have.

#### Aims

- Put in place procedures for good practice in the area of personal safety and child abuse prevention.
- Create a safe, trusting, responsive and caring environment in our school.
- Provide a discrete personal safety skills education programme which specifically addresses abuse and abuse prevention for pupils.
- Increase awareness and develop responsibility in the area of child protection throughout the school community.
- Provide for ongoing training in Stay Safe and related areas for all school staff.

## Stay Safe

Scoil Bhríde uses the Stay Safe programme. This is a personal safety and child abuse prevention programme. It is taught as part of the school's SPHE curriculum under the strand unit: Safety and Protection.

The objectives of the Stay Safe programme are as follows:

- To teach about Feelings, Friendship and Bullying
- To develop children's self-esteem, assertiveness and self-protective skills.
- How to identify and deal with an inappropriate or unsafe touch
- That it is ok to say 'no' to an adult in a situation where they feel unsafe, threatened or frightened.
- To identify adults whom they should tell if they are feeling frightened, threatened, worried or unsafe in any way.
- To understand how someone might bribe, trick or threaten to keep a secret
- It is never their fault if they are victimised or abused
- They should never go anywhere with or take anything from a stranger
- Appropriate language for telling (See Appendix 2: Stay Safe Language Infants 6<sup>th</sup>)
- To give children the skills necessary to enable them to recognise and resist abuse /victimisation /bullying
- To teach the rules i) Say No, Get Away and Tell and ii) Never Keep Touch A Secret

The Stay Safe Programme delivers a developmentally structured series of lessons for each age level under the topic headings: 'Feeling Safe and Unsafe', 'Friendship and Bullying', 'Touches', 'Secrets and Telling' and 'Strangers'.

It is the policy of the school that the Stay Safe programme is taught in every class every second year.

#### Review

This policy will be reviewed periodically by the Board of Management as deemed necessary.

# Ratification and Implementation

This policy will be implemented from April 2019

The Policy was reviewed and ratified by the Board of Management at its meeting on 14/03/2019
